- 3. Write various kinds of texts such as letters, stories, reinforcing what students have already learned in JPNS 101/102/201.
- 4. Learn 118 new kanji (totaling 363 kanji).
- 5. Develop communication skills by comparing culture/society/history with their own to broaden their understanding of the world

- 1. Listening: able to understand and participate in everyday conversation.

- 4. Writing: able to write memos, letters, suggestions/opinions/ideas. Able to work with colloquial/honorifics sentence structures. Word processor: Student will be able to use Japanese word processing adequately for given assignments.

### **COURSE TASKS**

The following tasks apply to the above learning objectives:

- 1. Quizzes 20% of final grade
- 2. Chapter/final tests 30% of final grade
- 3. Semester projects 25% of final grade (will be explained in detail on the first day of instruction)
- 4. Class participation, \*attendance/attentiveness, and language homework 25% of final grade
- \*Perfect attendance will earn students 15 bonus points.
- \*One to three absences will earn students 10 points.

\*NOTE: I will take attendance every class and points will be deducted for absences. Students are required to attend every class and participate in all activities conducted in class. Students are expected to prepare for the class and review what has been covered. Students who miss classes and fail to turn in homework promptly always fall behind and do not build up the basic foundation needed to improve their language ability.
