SOFTWARE, HARDWARE, & LEARNING RESOURCES

Audacity: Audacity is an audio editing software application that can be downloaded for free from http://audacity.sourceforge.net/download/. Audacity will be used for completing various assignments and projects in this course.

Adobe Premiere: Adobe Premiere an audio editing software application that is installed on the computers of Palanakila 124. Students will have access to these computers during class time and be given ample time in class to complete all video projects.

Important Note: You <u>do not</u> have to use, download, or purchase **Audacity** & **Adobe Premiere** to complete this course. You may use an application that you have access to and/or are already familiar with. Please be aware that the majority of the course Modules, Assignments, Tutorials, and Projects are based around the software applications mentioned above. If you <u>do not</u> use **Audacity** and **Adobe Premiere**, you will be responsible for learning the skills necessary to complete the requirements of the course using the software you have chosen to work with.

Cameras: You will be required to provide your own video camera for this course. A video camera on a smart phone will be more than adequate to complete the Assignments and Projects for this course. You many use more elaborate equipment if it is at your access. A limited amount of video cameras may be available to use through campus resources.

Microphones: While it is suggested that you use an external mic (e.g. USB, Bluetooth), you can also use a recording/dictation app from a smart phone or the built in mic in your computer's system. A limited amount of external mics will be available to use through campus resources.

Note: If you want to go beyond the requirements of the course (cameras & mics), contact me to see what kind of arrangements can be made to borrow equipment.
