CATALOG DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the basic theoretical approaches to personality, how they are developed, changed and analyzed. (3 hours lecture).

For this course, in addition to attending class, you are expected to complete a number of assignments outside of class time, including reading the textbook, studying for exams, and completing various written assignments and projects.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Recognize the study of personality psychology as a science.
- Discuss the basic perspectives, concepts, principles, and general information comprising the field of personality psychology.
- Utilize the various personality psychology models and concepts in explaining human behaviors

COURSE TASKS.

In addition to our face-to-face lectures, we will use Laulima throughout the semester. Laulima is WCC's online course management system, which you might have used in previous courses. On Laulima, you will find our official class gradebook, a resource folder containing important class materials (such as exam review sheets and assignment instructions), class announcements, and our syllabus along with a number of other useful items. Access to Laulima requires your regular school username and password.

You are responsible for keeping up in this class: your diligence in this matter is essential to your success. No late work is accepted in this class without written verification of extenuating medical or legal circumstances.

As there are many ways to showcase knowledge acquisition, you will have an opportunity to demonstrate what you've learned in this course using a variety of different formats:

Mastery Assessments: 60% (3 x 100 points = 300 points)
Personality Project: 20% (1 x 100 points = 100 points)
Writing Assignments: 20% (2 x 25, 1 x 50points = 100 points)

TOTAL = 500 points

Mastery Assessments (300 points)

We have two types of mastery assessments: quiz and exam. Throughout the semester, there will be three non-cumulative quizzes, each worth 100 points. Question format may include multiple-choice, fill-in-the-blank, true/false, and short answer. Review sheets will be posted on Laulima prior to each quiz. Quizzes will cover content from both my lectures (including any videos shown during the class) and the textbook, including materials presented in class that may not be included in the text and material from the text that I may not have time to cover in class. Make-up quizzes are allowed only in cases of documented excused absences (I will determine what counts as an excused absence) or with my pre-quizzes approval (approval is not guaranteed, check with me as far in advance as possible).

There is also a cumulative final exam. Format, content, and policies will mirror the structure of our quizzes. The final exam is also worth 100 points. Of your four mastery assessments, I will count your highest three grades

Personality Project (100 points)

Throughout the semester, you will work individually or with a group of up to 5 individuals on a personality project. I will provide a list of possible project topics and you/your group will select one. During the semester, we will have a project fair where you will present your/your group's project to the class. Additional details are available on Laulima.

Writing Assignments (3 assignments, 2 worth 25 points each & 1 worth 50 points)

Throughout the semester, you will complete three short writing assignments (2 pages each). For assignment 1, you will read and summarize an empirical journal article on a personality topic. Assignment 1 is worth 25 points. For assignment 2, you will select a personality theorist and read about both his/her theory and personal background and then you will discuss how you think the theorist's background influenced the theory. Assignment 2 is with 25 points. For assignment 3, I will provide a list many different short activities and exercises. You will select one, complete it, and write up what you discovered. Assignment 3 is worth 50 points. Additional details for each assignment are available on Laulima.
