Homework will be given daily and you should review your class work daily. This should take you no longer than an hour.

In order to succeed in this course you will have to attend class regularly, having finished your homework prior to class, and be prepared to use your language skills daily.

Student Learning Outcomes:

During this course, you will have opportunities to:

- Demonstrate the increased ability to comprehend and respond to basic spoken Hawaiian about daily activities, about the student's life and interests and to narrate past, present and future events..
- Demonstrate the increased ability to read and write Hawaiian sentences using more grammatical patterns and a working vocabulary of 1,000 words, plus idiomatic expressions.
- Speak Hawaiian with the increasing fluency and with proper inflection, intonation, and rhythm.
