
- 1. provide students with a large-scale analysis of human development and change over time.

The student learning outcomes for the course are:

- 1. Identify important individuals, places, organizations and concepts in modern world history.
- 2. Arrange, in chronological order, significant events in world history.
- 3. Describe and analyze global processes from 1500 C.E. to the present (e.g human migration, ecological forces, imperialism, decolonialism, industrialism, nationalism, globalization.)
- 4. Explain cause and effect relationships in history.
- 5. Compare and contrast historical experiences across cultures and time.
- 6. Relate historical events to contemporary issues and events.



METHOD OF INSTRUCTION: ONLINE

Ask yourself if online is the right method of instruction for you. If you are very independent, organized, focused, and techsavvy, AND have approximately 6 to 12 hours PER WEEK available to dedicate solely to the class, you should do fine in an online course. On the other hand, if these traits & time availability do not describe you, you are advised to drop the class immediately and take a traditional (face-to-face (F2F)) class.

- This course will expect that you are able to independently read, comprehend the "facts" on your own, complete the assignments, and navigate through Laulima with little guidance.
- Keeping on track is a must in this class. Always refer to the Class Schedule in this syllabus. It is very easy to fall behind in an online class. Please don't let this happen to you! You are about to learn the material at a relatively fast pace. This means that EVERY WEEK (other than during the week reserved for Exam #1 and the week reserved for Exam #2) you will be expected to read 1—2 chapters in the textbook, Topic Unit Highlights, and complete the corresponding assignments (PSIWs, Video Exploration Assignments, Quizzes, Discussion Posts, &/or Real World Assignment). If this sounds overwhelming, then please drop the class.
- Check ANNOUNCEMENTS on the Main Page in Laulima for any announcements pertaining to our class. Every Monday morning I will post an Announcement introducing the Week's Topic Unit & Assignments. This Announcement will also contain an attachment containing the Week's Topic Unit Highlights. Furthermore, you should check your UH email account frequently (you are required to use your UH hawaii.edu email account; however, you can have your mail from this account forwarded to an email account that you more frequently use).
- Make sure you adhere to the due dates to avoid the late penalty that is assessed for all late work.
 Furthermore, the Exams MUST be taken during their scheduled times. No exceptions, regardless of reason,

will be granted. If you find that you cannot be at a test-proctoring site (either physically or virtually) during the time when the proctored exam is scheduled, then you need to drop this class.

COURSE TASKS

Welcome to the wonderful world of history—where we will make the past come to life as we explore the histories of the various peoples of the world in order to become better informed citizens and make our modern, global world more meaningful! As we look into the past, it may be helpful to view history as a movie—full of characters, with some playing significant roles and others playing supporting ones, drama, and significant events. Together, then, we will analyze this movie called history, highlighting the important individuals, concepts/ideas, places, societies, events, and all the drama that went along with this. As we explore the drama of the past, you will learn how to identify, describe, and analyze the historical development of selected areas of the world from 1500 CE to the present, focusing on topics such as East-West interaction, cross-cultural conflict & exchanges, industrialization, nationalism, imperialism, and the world wars.

The class will be centered around the following course tasks, that serve as both learning and assessment tools, for the purpose of measuring your learning and your ability to meet the course SLOs.

- Take 2 Exams. Each Exam is worth 100 points total. The purpose of these exams is to assess both your critical thinking and writing skills regarding the material covered in class up to the moment of the exam. Exams will consist of a mixture of relevancy short written answer questions, matching, true/false, multiple choice, &/or essay. Although these exams will make use of your resourcefulness and you will be allowed to utilize 1 4" x 6" notecard, double-sided, typed or printed on the exam, it is highly recommended that you do not wait until the night before the exam to start studying. Exam #1 is completed AT YOUR DESIGNATED TEST-PROCTORING CENTER during the designated time period while Exam #2 is completed AT-HOME. Exam #1 emphasizes RESOURCEFULNESS, will have a time limit of 90 minutes, and you will be allowed a 4" x 6" notecard, double-sided, typed or printed for use when completing this exam. Exam #2 also emphasizes RESOURCEFULNESS, will have a time limit of 90 minutes, and will be completed at-home to be submitted in the "Exams" icon in our class Laulima site.
 - Exams are to be taken when scheduled. Make-up exams will only be given in cases of illness (with a
 doctor's note) or valid emergency. If you are unable to take the scheduled exam, I expect you or a
 family member to immediately contact me before or on the day of the scheduled exam. No makeup exam will be scheduled without you contacting me in a timely manner.
 - Since the Exam #1 is PROCTORED, you will need to find a test-proctoring site in which to take your exam. To find a test-proctoring site, go to the following website, and review their policies & hours: http://www.hawaii.edu/dl/faculty/prep/proctor_office.html

- If WCC is your home campus, you will take your exams at THE TESTING CENTER in Hale La'akea (the Library).
- You will need to let me know by email during the FIRST WEEK OF CLASS where you will be taking your exam if you will <u>NOT</u> be taking the proctored exam (Exam #1) at WCC's Testing Center in Hale La'akea. If I do <u>not</u> hear from you, I will automatically assume that you are taking your proctored exam at WCC's Testing Center in Hale La'akea.
- If you are unable to take your proctored exam at a UH-system testing site, then you will either need to drop the class or make arrangements to take the exam at home using the online test-proctoring system called ProctorU (which charges a fee of about \$15). ProctorU is a live online proctoring service that allows you to take your exam from the comfort of your home. ProctorU is available 24/7, however you will need to schedule your proctoring session at least 72 hours in advance to avoid any on demand scheduling fees. Creating a ProctorU account is very simple. All you will need to do is visit http://proctoru.com/portal/windward.hawaii. ProctorU also provides free technical support to ensure you have the best testing situation possible. That is available at www.proctoru.com/testitout. On this page you will also be able to test your equipment, learn about what to expect during your proctoring session, and ask any questions you may have about the proctoring process with a ProctorU representative. In order to use ProctorU you will need to have a high-speed internet connection, a webcam (internal or external), a windows or apple Operating System, and a government issued photo id. ProctorU recommends that you visit proctoru.com/testitout prior to your proctoring session to test your equipment. For additional technical services needed before your exam, you can click on the button that says "connect to a live person."
- ✓ Take 14 Quizzes which are found in the "Exams" icon in our class Laulima site. Each quiz will consist of 3—5 relevancy short written answer questions, matching, true/false, &/or multiple choice and you will have 15 minutes to complete the quiz. Quizzes will be on the assigned readings (Chapter(s) in textbook, Topic Unit Highlight(s), &/or Course Reader sources assigned) & Assignments (PSIWs, Video Exploration Assignments, &/or Discussion Forum(s)) for the week. Each quiz will be made available at the start of the week in which it was assigned (i.e., Monday at 12:00am) and must be completed by its specified due date in the syllabus which will always be on a Sunday by 11:59pm. If you need access to a quiz prior to the Week in which it is assigned for & have a legitimate reason as to why please email me so that arrangements can be made. Please note that late quizzes will continue to be accepted in Laulima until the last day of instruction; however, all quizzes completed after the due date will be assessed a late penalty of 25%. Each quiz is worth up to 10 points possible.
- ✓ Complete the **Real World Assignment: Cover Letter & Resume for a Historical Individual**. This assignment is worth 35 points total and will be due by or on **Sunday**, **4/17 by 11:59pm** and **emailed to me as a Word Document** (if you do not have Word, then your should email it to me either in PDF or RTF format). **The guidelines for this assignment are attached to this syllabus**.
 - For this assignment, you must pick a historical individual, post-1400 CE & no longer living, that was also a proven leader or has the potential to be a leader. Pretending that you are this person, you are to create a cover letter and resume for this person if he/she were applying for a job as Chief Executive Officer (C.E.O.) of a company. No more than one person per historical person. If you have a historical person in mind, you should sign up for that person ASAP by emailing me as it will be first come, first choice (you can also sign up in class but any emails received prior to your request will have first choice). Be sure to check for a confirmation email from me regarding your choice. I will post a list of those chosen individuals in the Homepage of our Laulima site. Once the name of an individual is listed on the Homepage, you are no longer able to pick that person. If you are unsure of a historical person, please contact me. Real World Assignments submitted after the due date will be assessed a 25% point penalty and will not be considered for the job. Note that a portion of Exam #2 will cover the Historical Individuals that you learn about.
 - After I receive all cover letters & resumes, I will post them in the "KickA** Industries Resumes" folder in the Resources icon in our Laulima site by Tuesday, 4/19. You are then to read all resumes so that you can then come up with the most qualified individual that you would hire (you cannot pick your own individual) so that you can then participate in the "KickA** Industries Hiring Executives Discussion" found in the "Discussion Board" icon in our class Laulima site by writing a 5—

7 sentence post on who you would hire and why. In your post, you should explain the individual strengths of your chosen individual (be as specific as possible when talking about these strengths) that make for a great leader. The due date for this post is **Sunday**, **4/24**, **by 11:59pm**. This post will be worth 5 points total. On **Tuesday**, **4/26**, I will announce which individual has been hired, along with a 1st runner-up individual and a 2nd runner-up individual. The students who created the cover letters & resumes of hired individual, and the 1st runner-up and 2nd runner-up will be awarded extra credit (Individual Hired receives 8-points extra credit; 1st runner-up receives 6-points extra credit; 2nd runner-up receives 4-points). Please note that this extra credit is in addition to the 4-points extra credit that everyone who turns in their Cover Letters & Resumes on-time will receive.

- Complete 5 Video Exploration Assignments found in the "Assignments" icon in Laulima. You will notice that there are sometimes multiple assignments assigned per week according to the class schedule. Assignments assigned for the week will always be due on the **Sunday by 11:59pm** of the week in which it was assigned. You will have access to all assignments starting on the first day of class in case you would like to complete them ahead of the week in which they are assigned for. Please note that late assignments will continue to be accepted in Laulima until the last day of instruction; however, all assignments completed after the due date will be assessed a late penalty of 25%. These assignments deal with you watching historical documentaries found on YouTube (links to which are in both our Laulima site's Homepage and in the Assignment itself) and answering questions based on these documentaries. See our Laulima class site Homepage for the links to these documentaries and further information on submission of questions. The amount of points each of these assignments in worth is varied depending on the number of questions asked in each assignment (1 point per question given). Note that you may have two Video Exploration Assignments due in the same week. The 5 Video Exploration Assignments total 15 points.
- Complete 10 Primary Source Investigation Worksheets (PSIWs) which are found in the "Assignments" icon in Laulima. These PSIW Assignments will ask you to play the role of a historian by evaluating, analyzing, and reflecting upon assigned primary source readings. They also serve the purpose of developing your critical thinking and writing skills. The source readings for your PSIWs are found in your Course Reader. Each PSIW Assignment is worth 6 points. The PSIW will ask you to reflect upon and analyze the source, and relate the topic of the source to a current event. If any 2 or more PSIWs are completed exactly alike, a zero will result. Please keep answers clear, concise, and in YOUR OWN WORDS. Do NOT copy your answers word-for-word out of these readings (unless it is when you are quoting the source). If you do so, this is considered PLAGIARISM, and you will not get credit for your answers. Assignments will always be due on Sunday by 11:59pm of the week in which it was assigned. See the class schedule for exact due dates. Note that you may have two PSIWs due in the same week. Due dates are also posted online by each assignment. If you are having trouble with Laulima, then I expect you to email me PSIW answers BEFORE the due date. Please note that late assignments will continue to be accepted in Laulima until the last day of instruction; however, all assignments completed after the due date will be assessed a late penalty of 25%.
- Participate in ALL <u>10</u> Discussions found in the "Discussion Board" icon in our class Laulima site (click on "Discussion Board" icon in Laulima to access; then look for the assigned Discussion for the Week to participate in). Refer to the class schedule to see assigned Discussion(s) for the week. Discussions will be graded on how well you follow the guidelines listed below:
 - For each Discussion, you are to only REPLY to the post that I have up. In other words, after reading the post that I have set up as an introduction to the Discussion, please just click "reply."
 - The instructions will be this: in your reply, please 1) answer the question that I post in 2—3 complete sentences, and 2) respond to the student's response that directly precedes your reply with 1—2 complete sentences. In other words, if you are the first student to reply to this post, then you are to 1) answer the question, and 2) reply to what I write about. Another example is if you are the 10th student to reply, then you will be 1) answering the question that I post below, and 2) replying to the reply of the 9th student. If you have any questions about this, please email me.
 - Your <u>answer</u> to the question that I post should consist of 2—3 complete sentences that are ORIGINAL in thought (and not just a paraphrase of the comments that preceded it).

- Your <u>response</u> to the student's response that directly precedes yours should consist of 1—2 complete sentences of <u>why</u> you agree or disagree with this student's response. In other words, don't just say you agree or disagree. Always <u>explain</u> your position.
- Always be <u>mindful</u> that you are RESPECTFUL of what your classmates have to say. <u>Negative comments will NOT be tolerated</u>. Please note that one of WCC's core values is Ho'ihi (Respect). This includes cultural awareness & aloha, student voice, 'ohana-style inclusiveness, and LGBTI Safe Zones. Discussion forums will NOT be used to discriminate against or put down your fellow students or other cultures & religions. If you conduct yourself in a way that disparages others, then you are in direct violation of the Student Code of Conduct and you will be dealt with appropriately (which could mean removal from class).
- Always <u>remember</u> that discussions are meant to provoke critical thinking on a given topic.
 Although you may disagree with what I or your fellow classmates have to say, I expect you to always be <u>respectful</u> in your disagreement.
- Each Discussion is worth up to 5 points total. Assigned Discussion Posts for the week will always be due on the **Sunday by 11:59pm** of the week in which it was assigned. No late Discussion Posts will be accepted, regardless of reason. If you are unable to post in the Discussion Board, please EMAIL me what you would have posted in the Discussion by the deadline. **ACCESS to the Discussion will be LIMITED** to Monday through Sunday for the week that it is assigned.

*(Hopefully, this will not happen, but if it turns out that more than 200 points is lost, an "F" for the class will result.)



Scenario: You, a historical individual from Modern World History, sees this job ad posted on a tree. Since you seek power & wealth, you decide to apply for this job that will take you into the future to lead those who battle these slow-moving zombies in order to create a better world.

To Do: Pick a historical individual (requirements: post-1400 CE & no longer living) that was also a leader or has the potential to be a leader. Pretending that you are this individual, apply for this job by creating a cover letter and resume. No more than one person per historical individual. If you have a historical individual in mind, you should sign up for that person ASAP by contacting me as it will be first come, first choice. If you are unsure of a historical individual, please contact me.

Purpose of Assignment: To have fun with history, to think & write critically & creatively, and to also see how learning history can have real world applicability. Although you are picking a historical individual to complete this assignment, you are learning how to write a cover letter and resume—two skills needed in the real world. This assignment also demonstrates your ability to meet the course's FG Hallmark #6 and SLO #1.

Things to Note:

- 1. You will be expected to do additional research on your historical individual in order to create an appropriate and accurate cover letter and resume. Although you need to be creative, you still need to be ACCURATE. In other words, you will NOT be able to make things up regarding your chosen person—if your person didn't do something, don't make something up. For example, do not say that your person conquered something if he or she did not. Or, do not say that your person learned his/her skills by attending college if he/she did not do so. If you need help in making sure that you are balancing the art of accuracy & creativity, be sure to contact me!
- 2. In your Cover Letter, you must properly place your chosen individual in his or her historical context as you explain why your person should be hired for the position. You need to also be sure to explain the significance (i.e., impact & legacy) of your individual. Note that it is always a good idea to keep your Cover Letter at no more than 1-page. Concise & to-the-point Cover Letters that clearly explain exactly why you should be hired through concrete examples (rather than just giving generalized statements taken straight from the job ad) are a crucial element in the hiring process.
- 3. You will need to include an Annotated Bibliography of primary & secondary sources used for information of your chosen historical individual. This needs to include at least 1 primary source.
- 4. Online/Hybrid Classes Only: All resumes must be typed in a Word Document and emailed to me by/on the due date. I will then convert them into PDFs and post them in the "KickA** Industries Resumes" folder in the Resources icon in our class Laulima site. You will then need to READ through all the Cover Letters & Resumes, and pick the 1 most qualified individuals (you cannot pick your own individual) that you feel should lead KickAss** Industries based ONLY on how well this individual presented himself or herself in their cover letter & resume. After you have come up with your choice, you are to then proceed to the Discussion Board icon in our class Laulima site and find the discussion entitled "KickA** Industries Hiring Executives Discussion" and write a 5—7 sentence post on the individual you picked and why you picked this person (i.e., you should explain his or her individual strengths (i.e., be as specific as possible when talking about these strengths) that make for a great leader.
