CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Psych 100 is an introductory course with emphasis on principles of human behavior. Topics covered include motivation, learning, perception, emotion, development, personality, states of consciousness, group processes, problem solving and thinking, and methods of inquiry. (3 hours lecture.)

This is a distance learning class conducted via the internet using Lulima, the University of Hawai‘i’s web-based course management system and LaunchPad, the textbook companion website. A web-based course such as this one requires that you have computer literacy skills.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

The student learning outcomes for the course are:

1. Recognize the study of psychology as a science.
2. Discuss the biological and environmental basis of human behavior.
3. Integrate the basic perspectives, concepts, principles, and general information comprising the field of psychology.

COURSE TASKS.

Because this course is conducted via the internet, our class communication, assignments, and testing will all be online. We have two websites that we will use throughout the semester, Lulima and LaunchPad. Lulima is WCC’s online course management system, which you might have used in previous courses. On Lulima, you will find our official class gradebook, resource folders for each unit (including supplemental PowerPoints), class announcements, class discussion boards, and our syllabus along with a number of other useful tools. Access to Lulima requires your regular school username and password.

Our second website, LaunchPad, is used in conjunction with our class textbook. Access to LaunchPad comes packaged with your book through the bookstore. If you purchase your book elsewhere, you will need to purchase access to LaunchPad separately, which you can do using the link below. Access to LaunchPad is necessary to complete many of the graded assignments for our course. You can temporarily access LaunchPad for free by clicking the 'Temporary Access' button on the website (see below for address). Your temporary access will expire 21 days after your first login. The temporary access comes with an eBook, so you can start on our assignments before you have a chance to stop by the bookstore.

When you register for LaunchPad, please use your name of record with the school, not a nickname, so that I may match your work to the gradebook.

When signing up for LaunchPad, make sure to use the website address provide above and to confirm that you are registering for the correct course. There are a number of fall LaunchPad sections listed under my name. Our course is labeled 'PSY 100 WCC Survey of Psychology Online Spring 2016' and 'Section 61103'. If you sign up for the wrong course, I won't be able to see your scores so you won't earn credit for your work.

When you complete work in LaunchPad, please take a screen shot of the completion screen and also confirm that your score is available in the LaunchPad gradebook. The screen shot will serve as your proof of completion if there is a website error, in which case, you will need your screen shot to receive credit.

You are responsible for keeping up in this class: your diligence in logging in regularly to the class websites and engaging in a timely fashion is essential to your success. No late work is accepted in this class without written verification of extenuating medical or legal circumstances.

You will have an opportunity to demonstrate what you've learned in this course using a variety of different formats. As you will see, you will be submitting more work for this class than you likely do for most of your face-to-face courses. Since this is an asynchronous online course, I

need to be able to measure how well you are keeping up with the materials; these assignments allow me to gauge how well you are keeping up with and understanding the course material.

LearningCurve Assignments (10 points each, 100 points total)

To encourage you to keep up with the assigned reading for this course, for each textbook chapter you are assigned to read, you will complete a LearningCurve Activity. LearningCurve is an online assessment tool available via LaunchPad that gauges how well you understand the textbook reading. These reading comprehension checks are completed online using the LaunchPad website. In order to successfully complete a LearningCurve assignment, you need to correctly answer a set number of questions, meaning that students with better comprehension of the material will need to answer fewer questions. These assignments are open-book, open-notes, and the website will provide excerpts of the text for you to review if you struggle with a question. Each successful, on-time submission is worth 10 points. Make-up assignments are not available. There are 11 LearningCurves throughout the semester; I will count your highest 10 scores, so you can skip one LearningCurve with it negatively impacting your final grade.

Chapter Activities (10 points each, 100 points total)

For each assigned chapter, you will complete an activity related to the chapter topic. Activities will vary chapter to chapter, for example, one week you might complete a short experiment, another week watch and review a film, and yet another week you might contribute a discussion post to our class discussion board. Details on each individual activity complete with instructions for where to complete and submit the activity will be posted on our Lualima coursepage under 'Resources'. Regardless of the specific activity, your response should make use of the information from the textbook and posted materials, be thoughtful and thorough, and when responding to a discussion post, build on the responses of fellow students. Activities will be graded on quality of your work, with a maximum score of 10 points per activity. Late responses are not accepted. There are 11 chapter activities throughout the semester; I will count your highest 10 scores, so you can skip one chapter activity with it negatively impacting your final.

Summative Quizzes (30 points each, 100 points each)

For each assigned chapter, you will complete a Summative Quiz on LaunchPad. Quizzes are open-book, open -notes but should be entirely your own work. You may submit a quiz as many times as you desire before the deadline. The score from your highest attempt counts. Each quiz is worth 30 points. Late quizzes are not accepted. There are 11 assigned quizzes and I will count your highest 10 scores (i.e. you can skip one quiz without any penalty).

IMPORTANT NOTE:

Do not wait until the last day to do your work because all kinds of problems can happen. This is online course reality. If you experience problems at the last minute and miss course work, your grade will be recorded as a zero.
