Introduction to scripting languages for the integration of applications and systems. Scripting in operating systems, web pages, server-side application integration, regular expressions, event handling, input validation, selection, repetition, and parameter passing for languages such as Perl, JavaScript, PHP, Python, and/or shell scripting.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Use regular expressions to solve different problems
- Produce robust client and server side scripts in a variety of scripting languages using software engineering techniques such as review and extensive program testing.
- Handle user and system generated events using various scripting languages.
- Validate user input using various scripting languages for security purposes.

Course Tasks

In this class, you must show mastery of each concept through a series of programming projects. Every assignment is worth 5 points. The only deadline for submission of assignments is May 3, 2017. This is a firm deadline. No work will be accepted after that date.

To get the full 5 points your work must not contain any errors. If there is an error then I will tell you what it is and return the assignment to you. Note that I will not tell you how to correct the error, only what it is. You should then correct the assignment and resubmit it for a higher grade. You will never receive a lower grade from a resubmission, only a higher or the same grade.

Assignment Tasks and Grading

Your letter grade will be determined by the number of assignments you complete. There are 14 assignments for a total of 70 points:

- A: 63 - 70 points
- B: 56 - 62 points
- C: 49 - 55 points
- D: 35 - 48 points
- F: 0 -34 points

We will use Lulima for submitting and returning all assignments. All grades will be posted in Lulima and you will be able to track your progress by utilizing the grade book.
