Catalog Description

This course will focus on the clinical skills necessary for safe and effective anesthesia and surgery of companion animal patients (dogs and cats). Skills such as intravenous catheter placement, proper endotracheal intubation, patient and surgical site preparation, and patient monitoring under general anesthesia will be stressed. The use and side effects of commonly used sedatives, analgesics and anesthetics will be covered. Postoperative procedures include patient monitoring and charting as well as client education for postoperative care. (3 hours lecture)

Prerequisite: Admission into Veterinary Technology program

Activities Required at Scheduled Times Other than Class Times: class projects, assignments, exams, etc...

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of ANSC 271/271L, the student should be able to:

- Understand the proper operation of anesthetic delivery equipment and monitoring instruments.
- Explain all aspects of anesthetic monitoring.
- Understand and integrate all aspects of patient management for common surgical procedures in companion animal species.
- Identify and provide appropriate instruments, supplies and environment to maintain asepsis during surgical procedures.
- Demonstrate understanding of routine surgical procedures including surgeries in these categories: ovariohysterectomy, cesarean section, orchiectomy, laparotomies, and orthopedic procedures.

Course Tasks

- Attend class meetings at scheduled times.
- Complete assigned readings.
- Complete 2 examinations, project/presentation, and all homework assignments
- Turn in a completed notebook that is in order and written with black or blue ink.

Assessment Tasks and Grading:

ATTENDANCE Lecture: (50 points): Attendance is **mandatory** and defined as being present in class for at least 75% of the class period. Each student is allowed one absence without penalty. Each unexcused absence beyond the one allowed, will result in a deduction of 10 points from the student's attendance score. If a student has an excused absence, a doctor's note or documentation must be given to the instructor within 48 hours of returning to school.

Additionally, attendance for class guest lectures is imperative. Missing a guest lecture will result in an automatic deduction of 25 points.

EXAMS: Exams are worth 100 (midterm) and 200 (Final) points each. The student will take two exams to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of information presented in the lectures, text readings, and assignments. Both exams will be multiple choice exams taken in the testing center (outside of class time). The final exam will be cumulative multiple choice, and the focus will be on knowledge needed for the Veterinary Technician Exam.

Project/Presentation (100): Each student will be required to give a presentation (as a small group or individual) on a surgical procedure performed in veterinary medicine.

NOTEBOOK (25 points): Students are REQUIRED to take detailed notes during lecture. These notes must be handwritten and kept in a binder as your 271 notebook. Worksheets and other study materials will be given in class. Students will be required to have them completed and kept in order, in the notebook along with their notes and other handouts that will be graded at the end of the semester.

Class Assignments & Quizzes: (200) Several smaller assignments and multiple quizzes will be given throughout the semester

Please note you are required to have 100% of your Clinical Skills checked off, complete all assignments and tests, and **obtain a score of at least 70% on the final exam to pass the course.** There will be ample opportunity during labs to complete the skills, but it is your responsibility to ensure you complete them all.
