# **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

# **ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION (20%)**

Attendance in this class for all assigned periods is mandatory and attendance will be taken daily. If you are absent, you are responsible for obtaining material and information you missed from other class members. The instructor will make reasonable accommodation for students who are dealing with medical and other emergencies. Students must notify the instructor beforehand via email if they know that they will miss class.

This course requires discussion and group work. Participation in in-class assignments will be evaluated. Students are expected not only to complete the assigned reading for each week, but also to generate thoughtful and serious questions and comments that will benefit the class as a whole. To encourage class participation, there will be class assignments that include freewrites, paired sharing, small group activities, answering questions based on lectures and videos shown in class.

Technology and Participation: In addition to participating in class, this course will incorporate some online instruction. There are times when I will allow you to use your phones, laptops, or mobile devices in class. However, most of the time when we meet face to face, cell phones, laptops, and other mobile devices should be **OFF AND PUT AWAY** during class time – your attendance grade will be affected if you do not abide by this policy.

## **QUIZZES (20%)**

Short in class quizzes will be given especially on the readings but they will also address other course material including lectures, discussions, and videos.

## **WRITING ASSIGNMENTS (30%)**

To demonstrate your understanding of readings, lectures, videos, and discussions, you will write short 1-2 page, typed, double spaced papers. For each writing assignment, you will be given specific questions, themes, or topics to write about. You should use specific examples to demonstrate what you are learning.

## **EXAMINATIONS (30%)**

To measure knowledge and understanding of historical information, there will be three examinations that will include definitions, fill in the blanks, short answer, and essay questions. Examinations cannot be made up without a good reason, and a student may be asked to provide written documentation to take a make up exam (i.e. doctor's or employer's note).

# **GENERAL POLICIES**

**ABSENCES:** While absences for legitimate (and documented) reasons may be excused, there is no real way to make up for missing class. For absences to be excused, students must contact me prior to their absence if they are able. Even if absences are excused, students are still responsible for the material missed in class.
