## **Course Tasks**

- Attend class at scheduled times and participate in class discussions
- Complete assigned readings prior to lecture
- Complete assignments and workbook
- Complete 10 quizzes
- Complete 2 midterm exams and 1 final exam
- Maintain a binder with worksheets and other materials in order and filled out
- Optional: extra credit and eCAFE

#### **Assessment Tasks and Grading**

**Class participation and assigned readings**: (25 points) Students will be given an opportunity to answer questions in class. Base-line participation is expected (5 correct answers) and bonus points will be awarded to students based on their level of interaction. Material covered will include previously covered topics as well as topics scheduled for that day. Questions will be asked of the assigned readings which should be completed prior to class.

**ATTENDANCE**: (50 points) Attendance is **mandatory** and defined as being present in class for at least 75% of the class period. Each student is allowed one absence without penalty. Each unexcused absence beyond the one allowed, will result in a deduction of 10 points from the student's attendance score. **Additionally, attendance for class guest lectures is <u>imperative</u>. <b>Missing a guest lecture will result in an <u>automatic deduction of 25 points</u>.** 

**Assignments**: (100 points) Students will complete 2 assignments worth 50 points each.

**Quizzes:** (100 points) Quizzes will be held at the beginning of class throughout the semester. The material will be cumulative.

**Exams:** (350 points) The student will take two exams worth 100 points each (non-cumulative) to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of information presented in the lectures, text readings, and assignments. The final exam will be worth 150 points and will be cumulative.

**Binder:** (50 points) There will be worksheets and other materials given in class. These are to be used as study guides and must be filled out and kept in a binder. The binder must have your name on it, syllabus first, worksheets and other handouts after that and in order from the date it was given. In order, for students to get points on their notebook, they must have everything filled out in the notebook in black ink only or they will receive a deduction. If the notebook is not kept in order, students will get an automatic 5 points deduction. Notebooks will be collected after each midterm exam (worth 25 points each).

**Extra credit:** Extra credit opportunity involves participation in the Course Evaluation (10 points).
