Catalog Description

An elementary course in the Hawaiian language which focuses on rules of grammar, pattern drills, the building of an adequate vocabulary to facilitate conversation, and reading of selected materials at an elementary level.



Student Learning Outcomes

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

1. Recognize and reproduce the correct pronunciation of consonants, semivowels, vowels, diphthongs, words, and names in Hawaiian.
2. Demonstrate the ability to comprehend and respond to basic directions, requests, questions, and answers.
3. Demonstrate the ability to generate basic phrases and sentences for everyday situations with a vocabulary of 400-500 Hawaiian words, plus idiomatic expressions.
4. Demonstrate the ability to read and write Hawaiian sentences at an elementary level on subject matter covered in class.
5. Speak Hawaiian with proper inflection, intonation, and rhythm.

Course Format and Pacing

This course consists of eleven modules covering the concepts below. Each module contains required learning materials i.e. lectures, tutorials, readings, and assignments. Each module will last between 3 - 6 days approximately. Additionally, more specific objectives will be provided during the course for each module:

Week 1: Ha'awina 1 – An introduction to the alphabet, orthography, and sound of the Hawaiian language through everyday phrases, place names, and our Ali'i.

Ha'awina 2 – An introduction to Class-Inclusion sentences and noun phrases in Hawaiian.

Week 2: Ha'awina 3 – An introduction to Equational Sentences, expanded Class-Inclusion sentences, and noun phrases with definite articles.

Ha'awina 4 – An introduction to Imperative sentences.

Week 3: Ha'awina 5 – An introduction to Stative Verb sentences and plural pronouns.

Ha'awina 6 – An introduction to simple verb sentences and infinitives.

Week 4: Mahele 1 - Unit Review & Exam(s) – A unit review of the materials covered from Ha'awina 2 - 6, as well as a unit exam that will test our proficiency in listening and reading comprehension, as well as communicating through speaking and writing.

Week 5: Ha'awina 7 – An introduction to *Ua* Verb sentences, or past tense, expanded Class-Inclusion and Equational sentences, and Imperative sentences as suggestions.

Week 6: Ha'awina 8 –An introduction to future and progressive action sentences, and family terms

Week 7: Ha'awina 9 –An introduction to possessives and locational sentences.

Week 8: Mahele 2 - Unit Review & Exam(s) –A unit review of the materials covered from Ha'awina 7 - 9, as well as a unit exam that will test our proficiency in listening and reading comprehension, as well as communicating through speaking and writing.



To get started, be sure to read the syllabus and then proceed to Week 1 - Ha'awina 1 Overview and Week 1 - Ha'awina 2 Overview in "Modules" located inside the menu bar to the left of the Canvas course site. All assignments for each week are due electronically on the Sunday by 11:59 pm (HST) of the current week and available two weeks prior to its due date. However, this availability excludes week 1. Grades for assignments will be posted within 24 to 48 hours of the due date. Weekly announcements will be posted in Announcements on Monday(s) and Thursday(s).

Optional Hui Kama'ilio meeting is held weekly throughout the course. Hui Kama'ilio was created to increase and support language learning. This meeting is not required, however recommended. Meeting information will be emailed.

Quizzes

The quizzes will be based on the lectures and assigned reading for the week. Although the quizzes are open-book, they are timed. As such, students who have not studied can expect to do poorly on the quizzes. For each quiz, the attempt yielding the highest score will be used to calculate the student's grade.

Examinations

The student will take 8 exams total; Mahele 1 Unit Exam (4 tests) and Mahele 2 Unit Exam (4 tests). Students who fail to take the exam by the required date and time will receive a zero score on the exam. If you experience a technical problem with the exam, you must alert the instructor immediately.

Assignments

The student will complete 7 dialog recordings, all exercises from the 9 chapters (ha'awina), 5 Ho'olauna, 4 Ho'olauna Ali'i, 1 assignment on Why 'Ölelo Hawai'i, 1 assignment on 'O Wai Kou Inoa, and 3 reaction assignments to Nā Hulu Kupuna. The purpose of these assignments is to facilitate open discussion of course topics between students in the class and to support language acquisition. For discussion boards, you will be required to post a response based on the prompt posted by your instructor. You will also be required to read and post responses to at least ONE of the posts from your fellow students. Both your initial post and your responses MUST be completed by the deadline. Your posts and responses will be graded based on effort, clarity, and accuracy. The topics for each discussion board will be posted on the course website.

Additional Information

Aloha mai kākou. 'O Kapela Wong ko'u inoa a 'o wau nō ke kumu no kēia papa 'Ōlelo Hawai'i. 'O Hawaii ku'u kulāiwi a he kupa au no ka 'āina ho'opulapula o Nānākuli a me ke awāwa 'o Maunalaha. Akā i kēia mau lā noho au me ko'u 'ohana i ke ahupua'a o Honouliuli ma ka moku o 'Ewa i ka mokupuni o O'ahu. He haumāna au o ka Papahana Kaiapuni mai ku'u wā kamali'i a hiki loa aku i ka'u puka 'ana aku mai ke kula ki'eki'e. Ua komo a puka wau mai ka Pūnana Leo 'o Wai'anae, Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Nānākuli a me Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue. Ua puka maila wau mai ke Kula Nui o Hawai'i ma Mānoa me ke kekelē laepua ma ka 'Ōlelo Hawai'i a me ka 'Ike Hawai'i. I kēia manawa, he haumāna au e nowelo ana i ka'u kekelē laeo'o ma ke kālai no'ono'o ma Chaminade University. 'O Kaihilani Wong ka inoa o ku'u kāne li'a aloha a no Ni'ihau mai kona 'ohana. 'Elua a māua pua, 'o Kahiliokalani (8) lāua 'o Kawelonaakala (7). Hele lāua i Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue. He 'ohana 'ōlelo Hawai'i mākou. Puni wau i ka hula e la'a pū me ka ulana 'ana i ka lauhala. 'Oia iholā no ka manawa. Ke lana mai nei ko'u mana'o e maika'i 'ana nō kēia kau mua a kākou ma lalo o ka malu o Hawai'iloa.

Hawai'i is my homeland and I am from Nānākuli and Maunalaha valley, but I currently live in Honouliuli, in 'Ewa, on the island of O'ahu with my family. I am a product of the Hawaiian Immersion Program from the age of three to high school. I graduated from Pūnana Leo 'o Wai'anae, Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Nānākuli and Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue. I earned a B.A. in Hawaiian Studies and Hawaiian Language from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. I am currently working on my Masters in Counseling Psychology at Chaminade University. My husband's name is Kaihilani Wong and we have two children, Kahiliokalani (8) and Kawelonaakala (7). They are both enrolled in the Hawaiian Immersion program at Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue. We are a Hawaiian language speaking family. In my spare time I enjoy hula and weaving lauhala. I am looking forward to getting to know you all in this 8 week course.

Our ancestors had a saying, "*O ke kahua ma mua, ma hope ke kūkulu,*" meaning the foundation first, then the building. This pearl of wisdom found in 'Ōlelo No'ēau Hawaiian Proverbs and Poetical Sayings #2459, is the essence of this HAW 101 course. Novice levels of Hawaiian language will be taught so that students will gain necessary foundational knowledge in order to advance to higher levels of Hawaiian language. Upon completion of elementary Hawaiian, students can then *kūkulu*, build upon their foundation in intermediate and advance Hawaiian. Thus building the frames, walls, and so forth of their house of Hawaiian language knowledge. Each foundation and house built, is a testament to the knowledge and wisdom of our ancestors who have paved the path we stride upon. Since this course is asynchronous, you might at times feel alone, but be steadfast in knowing that I am always here to support you and that we are all building our foundation together at a distance.

Although the Title IX Coordinator and I cannot guarantee confidentiality, you will still have options about how your case will be handled. My goal is to make sure you are aware of the range of options available to you and have access to the resources and support you need.
