Introductory course in 'ukulele. Basic principles of performance; history and development of 'ukulele playing methods. Focus on principles of performance. Course is intended for students with little or no experience in playing the ukulele. May be repeated for up to 6 credits. (1 hour lecture, 2 hours lecture/lab)

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

1. Discuss the history of 'ukulele development.

- 2. Demonstrate basic concepts, such as rhythm, notation, dynamics, and expression in accurate performances.
- 3. Strum chords in different keys, applying music theory applications.
- 4. Learn and demonstrate professional performance practices.

COURSE TASKS

- 1. Assignments: Students will be required to turn in weekly assignments (via Laulima and Flipgrid). Due dates for all assignments will be specified by the instructor. Being that assignments are set up to help you to move forward with the course content, late work will not be accepted.
- <u>2. Recordings</u>: You will be required to record yourself playing the songs learned in class. These recordings are different than the ones you will do for assignments because these will be used as a type of exam to test the outcome of the instruction received (summative). The recordings for assignments are used to help the instructor understand where students are struggling to inform instruction.
