CATALOG DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with theories of biological, cognitive, and psycho-social development from infancy to adulthood and with similarities and differences among individuals and their cultures.

Recommended Preparation: PSY 100

This is an online, asynchronous class. It will be conducted via the internet using Laulima, the University of Hawai'i's web-based course management and Revel (software accompanying the text). This course requires you to have a computer, internet access, and the use of your hawaii.edu email account. The course cannot be completed using a smart phone or tablet. Please note, there are computers in the library for students to utilize on campus if needed.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

1. Compare and contrast the various theories of human development and behavior.
2. Describe biological, cognitive, and psychosocial development for each life-span period.
3. Investigate the existence of similarities, differences, and uniqueness in human development among individuals and their culture.

4. Apply human development theories and concepts to personal, social, educational, and occupational experiences.

COURSE TASKS

This is an 8 week class, so the reading will be greater and the work pace will be faster than a full semester class. We will cover one of each 8 parts of our text per week. Each part may include 2-3 chapters. Please check our class site on Lualima every Monday (at least) for any additional assignment information or updates. As this is an asynchronous class, you will be responsible for managing your time and submitting assignments when due. Asynchronous classes require a great deal of organization and independent regulation. If this is becoming overwhelming, please reach out to me and/or our campus services to assist you in getting back on track.

REVEL Text Readings/Assignments/Quizzes (3500 pts; 70% of your grade)

As part of the etext for this class, you will be required to access and complete the accompanying Revel assignments, quizzes, concept checks, and writing assignments. In addition, you will create a Virtual Child and Virtual Life as you go through the stages of development in the text. All of these assignments will gain points for the parts 1-8 of the text. The points will convert to a percentage. You will be able to see your scores/points in Revel as you go along. That will be what will be entered as your grade for each of the 8 parts respectively. You can expect the following possible points:

Module Quizzes: 3 pts. per question

Chapter Quizzes: 5 pts. per question

Concept Checks: 1 pt. per questions

Shared Writings: 20 pts. each

My Virtual Life: 50 pts per stage

The quizzes allow for up to 3 tries, with one less point for each additional try. All assignments will be published and accessible 2 weeks before the due dates. You are welcome to work ahead. However, late work will not be accepted.

Group Presentation (500 points; 10% of your total grade)

You will work in groups to present one of the sections in our text. This will include making a video with a Google Slides presentation and an activity to help your fellow students understand what they've read/heard. You will be provided with slides containing the pictures, graphs, and diagrams from the text to use if you so choose. The video, slide presentation, and a description of the activity must be shared with me by email one week prior to the presentation. The total time for the presentation and activity will be approximately 30 minutes. You will be evaluated on overall presentation quality as well as your level of collaboration with your group. You and your group members will help me assess your contributions and efforts prior to the presentation itself. Your fellow students will assist in evaluating the group presentation.

Field Activities (500 points each; 20% of your total grade)

You will complete two out-of-class activities. These activities will take between 3-4 hours each to complete. Options will be given for these activities. Activities may involve outside readings, observations, interviews, videos, and reflections. All activities will allow for multiple choices to represent your gained knowledge and understanding. You will be given a list of these activity opportunities and representation options at least two weeks before each is due.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

Here is the breakdown of the assignments for this class:

- Revel Assignments: 3500 points
- Group Presentation: 500 points
- Field Activities: 1000 points

Extra credit:

There will be opportunities to earn extra credit in this class in the following ways:

1. Choose from a list of writing prompts I will provide. Write 2-3 pages (double spaced) and take the draft to the WCC Ka Piko writing lab to work on writing skills. You must submit your original writing and the final draft. Also, the tutor must email me to verify this work was done in the writing lab.
2. Utilize the WCC Kumuola Lounge (Hale ‘Akoakua 116B) for a total of 3 hours, beginning with an intake interview/talk story with Kahoku Baker Calventas, the Kumuola Grant Coordinator. She can assist you with identifying any challenges you may be having and connect you with resources. She can also help with career counseling and UH pathway options. You can make an appointment with her by calling 462-4797 or emailing Kahoku at ebaker@hawaii.edu. Kahoku must email me to verify the time spent with her and the outcome.
3. Volunteer at a family engagement event or in a childcare center/preschool for 3 hours and write a 1-2 page reflection. This MUST BE pre-approved by me and we will work out the details together. If you need suggestions, I am happy to provide some.

You may do 2 out of the 3 and each is worth 100 extra credit points.
