CATALOG DESCRIPTION

IS 105 B & C is a Career and Education Exploration class that will place our focus on career and life decisions, as we participate in self-discovery exercises, complete interest and personality assessments, explore career options, and complete career field research. The emphasis will be placed on careers in BUSINESS but will be applicable across the board.

Activities Required at Scheduled Times Other than Class Times

Face to face class will be held at Hauula Community Center every Tuesday from 6:00 pm - 7:00 pm. Students will also have asynchronous activities and videos to watch that are due every Saturday by 11:59 pm.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. That you have a good understanding of your personality type and how that will affect your career choice.
- 2. That you have a good understanding of your interests as they relate to the job market.
- 3. That you learn something about yourself that you did not already know.
- 4. That you gain the skills needed to be proactive in the pursuit of your education as well as your career training.
- 5. That you have a good understanding of what your options in Business are.
- 6. That you understand what options, majors, and minors, are available in the UH system.
- 7. The steps you need to take to complete your degree.

- 8. Articulate your working style, and how you prefer to give and receive information.
- 9. You will have an initial plan for your near educational future.

COURSE TASKS

Personality assessment— Learning the role that your personality plays in your success is key to your progression throughout your future. We utilize a website called 16personalities. You will go to https://www.16personalities.com/ and click on "Take the Test". After completing the assessment, enter your Hawaii.edu email and they will email you your results.

Personal Motivation— We will look at what is important to you and what is your WHY.

Goals – We will work through some goal-setting activities.

Career Exploration – We will explore career options based on your preferences.
