COURSE TASKS

<u>1. Assignments</u>: Students will be required to turn in weekly assignments (via Laulima and Flipgrid). Due dates for all assignments will be specified by the instructor. Being that assignments are set up to help you to move forward with the course content, late work will not be accepted.

<u>2. Recordings</u>: You will be required to record yourself playing the songs learned in class. These recordings are different than the ones you will do for assignments because these will be used as a type of exam to test the outcome of the instruction received (summative). The recordings for assignments are used to help the instructor understand where students are struggling to inform instruction.
