STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

• Demonstrate the increased ability to comprehend and respond to basic spoken Hawaiian about daily activities, about the student's life and interests and to narrate past, present and future events.

- Demonstrate the increased ability to read and write Hawaiian sentences using more grammatical patterns and a working vocabulary of some 1,000 words, plus idiomatic expressions.
- Speak Hawaiian with increasing fluency and with correct inflection, intonation and rhythm.

COURSE GOALS

The course consists of six modules, two-unit reviews, and two-unit exams. Each will last approximately one week in length, and the Unit Review and Exam together will be approximately one week in length as well. Additionally, more specific objectives will be provided during the course for each module:

- Module 10 An introduction to negative verb sentences and numbers.
- Module 11 An introduction to 'Have a' sentences.
- Module 12 –An introduction to 'Have a number' sentences and K-less possessives.
- Mahele 3 Unit Review A review of the content from unit 3.
- Mahele 3 Unit Exam A unit exam that will test our proficiency in listening and reading comprehension, as well as communicating through speaking and writing.
- Module 13 An introduction to *Ke* verb *nei* sentences and locatives.
- **Module 14** An introduction to comparative sentences and negative imperative sentences.
- Module 15 An introduction to verb classes and stative verbs with causatives.
- Mahele 4 Unit Review A review of the content from unit 4.
- Mahele 4 Unit Exam A unit exam that will test our proficiency in listening and reading comprehension, as well as communicating through speaking and writing.

COURSE TASKS

- Quizzes (545 points total)
 - O The student will complete online quizzes to assess their comprehension of course materials. The quizzes will be based on the lectures and assigned reading for the week. Although the quizzes are open-book, they are timed. As such, students who have not studied can expect to do poorly on the quizzes. For each quiz, the attempt yielding the highest score will be used to calculate the student's grade.
- Examinations (1200 points total 150 points each for each exam)
 - O The student will take 8 exams total; Mahele 3 Unit Exam (4 tests) and Mahele 4 Unit Exam (4 tests). Exams will be given through the online course site, Canvas site. Students who fail to take the exam by the required date and time will receive a zero score on the exam. If you experience a technical problem with the exam, you must alert me immediately.
- Assignments (838 points total)
 - The student will complete 6 dialog recordings, all exercises from the 6 modules (ha'awina), 12 discussion board posts, and two reviews (ho'i hope). For discussion boards, you will be required to post a response based on the prompt posted by your instructor. You will also be required to read and post responses to your fellow classmates. The purpose of these assignments is to facilitate open discussion of course topics between students in the class. Both your initial post

and your responses MUST be completed by the deadline. Your post and responses will be graded based on effort, clarity, and accuracy. The topics for each discussion board will be posted on the course website. Students are asked to respond to assignment discussion topics with thoughtful commentary, incorporating readings and other class materials into their posting. Late assignments will be accepted. However, they will be penalized 5% for each week after the due date.

Calculation of grade: The final letter grade for this course will be determined on the basis of the total number of points and will follow the normal University of Hawaii grading system. Thus, the letter grade is determined by the percentage of points accumulated, based on the following scale:

A - 90%-100% (2324 - 2583 points)

B - 80%-89% (2066 - 2323 points)

C - 70% - 79% (1808 - 2065 points)

D - 60%-69% (1549 - 1807 points)

F - 0.59% (0 - 1548 points)
