CATALOG DESCRIPTION

ART 101 is an introductory course that focuses on the question "What is the nature of visual art?" and the forms and conditions under which art is expressed. Projects will be required. Independent field trips to art galleries may be required. (3 hours lecture) This summer we will explore what art is, how and why it is made, and experience what it's like to see, think and work in an artistic mode. To understand the role of art in our lives today, we will participate as both the artist and the observer. We will achieve this through discussions and readings full of images, a bit of research, and demonstrations and hands-on projects in various art media and styles. This course also serves as an introduction and preparation for the studio art program here at WCC.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain these outcomes:

- Identify how an appreciation of the visual arts influences the quality of life.
- Analyze how the elements of form and principles of design work together with the creative process to produce a work of art.
- Describe individual art disciplines, media, and specific methods of making art.
- Define major historical and contemporary movements in art and discuss how it reflects its time and culture.
- Execute studio art projects in order to experience visual concepts, art disciplines and media in each of the following:
- Maintain a comprehensive sketchbook demonstrating understanding of the elements of art.

- Create at least one basic 2D and 3D studio art project, utilizing media specific to the successful outcome of each project.
- Execute one project based upon art history or museum observation.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

Your grade will be achieved in two main ways. The 'Academic' side of things will involve reading/video worksheets and quizzes, written exams, some in-class/group work, and an exhibition/gallery review assignment. These will cover vocabulary and concepts from the readings/videos, slideshows/discussions, and art activities as appropriate. There will also be some teamwork and in-class activities to help us gain greater command of our knowledge through collaboration. Please take notes extensively throughout the summer! I will make every attempt to be clear as to what you will be responsible to know, but please ask when you are unsure about anything.

The 'Art' part of the grade comes from participation in your own artwork and activities using the various two- and three-dimensional methods introduced:

You will be creating a Sketchbook this summer full of in-class and at-home projects that require your application of the art concepts we discuss and explore. This will be checked at mid-term and at the end of the summer for grading. Each assignment will show the available points, and some in-class activities will count as bonus points.

You will also have three larger Art Projects throughout the summer and a Final. They will involve a bit more time, so please prepare and allow for this.

Your artwork will not be considered based on pre-existing 'talent', but on your understanding of the art concepts presented and your effort in attempting to work with them. No one is required to know how to draw. You will learn all you need to know to complete these assignments and you may be surprised at the skills you develop. Projects will often take a few tries to really 'get it', and that's what I hope you'll do! The time, thought and energy invested are readily apparent and any quick-rushed projects will be scored accordingly. All artwork carries the possibility of bonus points for work done beyond the expectations of a beginning student. Go For It!

**CHECK LAULIMA REGULARLY! All lectures and assignments will be there. Evaluation will be based on:

- -How well you fulfill the assignments; your individual progress and artwork; class participation, effort and creativity.
- -Lectures, discussions and audio-visual materials are crucial to this course; therefore, participation in these activities is *required*. Your artwork must have a disciplined and professional sense of presentation, design, vitality and craftsmanship.
- -3 main projects, sketchbook assignments, class work, homework, quizzes and tests will be given.

Points for absences and lates will be subtracted. The totals will equate as a letter grade as follows:

ATTENDANCE

Attendance and participation will be vital to your success! You are expected to attend all classes, arrive on time, and remain for the entire class period. When you miss a class you are responsible to consult with your peers and the instructor for the material covered in your absence. Your attendance will be counted as follows:

You are allowed 3 'free' absences and 3 'free' lates (up to ten minutes MAX).

- each additional absence will begin to lower your grade
- every two additional lates will equal one absence
- Late Work will drop 10% per week, 3 week max. (No Late Finals.)

- *Important! Make-up exams will only be allowed at instructor's discretion. These must be arranged with the instructor and be taken within one week of test date at WCC's 'Testing Center' (unless a significant circumstance prevails).
