"Hawaiian 201: Intermediate Hawaiian I" is a continuation of HAW 102 with emphasis on increasing proficiency in use of major sentence patterns in reading, writing, conversation, and translation

Credit for HAW 102 or consent of instructor.

Throughout the course, students are welcome to join **Office Hours** to ask questions and/or discuss the learning materials with the instructor. No appointment needed. Starting in week 2, students have the option to log on to Zoom once a week for **Hui Kama'ilio** to practice conversational skills with Hawaiian language students, teachers, and Supplemental Instructors. Hui Kama'ilio details are posted in Announcements on the course site.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to comprehend and respond to sentence structures of greater length and complexity on a variety of topics.
- 2. Demonstrate the ability to comprehend, speak, read and write at the intermediate level with a working vocabulary of some 1, 500 words, plus idiomatic expressions.
- 3. Write original expositions and communicate on a variety of topics within the student's experience.

COURSE TASKS

- Assignments (609 points total)
 - The student will complete 6 module exercises, 6 topic posts on Flip, and 6 discussion posts (hui heluhelu & journal). The purpose of the assignments on flip is to create a sense of community and encourage speaking skills. The purpose of discussion assignments is to foster open discussion of course topics between students in the class. Your posts and responses will be graded based on effort, clarity, and accuracy.
- Quizzes (303 points total)
 - The student will complete online quizzes to assess their comprehension of course materials. The quizzes will be based on the lectures and assigned reading for the week. Although the quizzes are open-book, they are timed. As such, students who have not studied can expect to do poorly on the quizzes. For each quiz, the attempt yielding the highest score will be used to calculate the student's grade.
- Presentation (120 points total)
 - o The student will complete two presentations for Mahele 5 and Mahele 6.
- Review (50 points total)
 - o The student will complete two unit reviews; Mahele 5 and Mahele 6.

Calculation of grade: The final letter grade for this course will be determined on the basis of the total number of points and will follow the normal University of Hawaii grading system. Thus, the letter grade is determined by the percentage of points accumulated, based on the following scale:

B - 80%-89% (865 - 972 points)

C - 70%-79% (757 - 864 points)

D - 60%-69% (649 - 756 points)

F - 0 -59% (0 - 648 points)
