CATALOG DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with theories of biological, cognitive, and psycho-social development from infancy to adulthood and with similarities and differences among individuals and their cultures.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. Compare and contrast the various theories of human development and behavior.
- 2. Describe biological, cognitive, and psychosocial development for each life-span period.
- 3. Investigate the existence of similarities, differences, and uniqueness in human development among individuals and their culture.
- 4. Apply human development theories and concepts to personal, social, educational, and occupational experiences.

COURSE TASKS

This is an in-person class on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1-3pm.

Chapter Quizzes

You will have a quiz at the end of each muli-chapter section. If you are absent on the day of the quiz, you will be expected to take the quiz in the next class.

Group Presentation

You will work in groups to present one of the chapters in our text. The total time for the presentation and activity will be approximately 45 minutes and include an engaging class activity. Your group will also submit 5 questions from your assigned chapter for our section quiz. You will be evaluated on overall presentation quality (content, delivery and engagement of classmates), as well as your level of collaboration with your group. You submit your presentation and quiz one week prior to the delivery date and will be asked to revise if needed.

Out-of-Class Activities

You will complete three out of class activities from a list of options. These activities will take between 2-3 hours each to complete and will be assigned on the weeks when we do not have in person class. Options will be given for these activities. Activities may involve outside readings, observations, interviews, and reflections. All activities will allow for multiple choices to represent your gained knowledge and understanding. You will be given a list of these activity opportunities and representation options at least two weeks before each is due.

Writing Prompts

There will be 10 writing assignments to respond to chapter readings. These will be short answer questions or 1-2 page reflections using at least two references to that week's textbook readings assignments on that topic. **All writing assignments should be in Times New Roman, double spaced and 12 font if typed.** The point system allows you to miss one, as the lowest writing prompt score will be dropped.

Final Assessment

The final assessment will be taken in the last class on May 2, 2023.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

Here is the breakdown of the assignments for this class:
