CATALOG DESCRIPTION

An introduction to Hawaiia and Hawaiian culture in the context of the larger Pacific, including Hawaiian origins, language, land, history, society, religion, and the arts.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Throughout the semester we will contemplate our own kuleana as students, teachers, and people, who call Hawai'i home and what that means. Upon successful completion of HWST 107, nā haumāna should be able to reach the following learning outcomes for the course:

- Compare and contrast cultures and histories of the Pacific island peoples in relation to their languages, religious traditions, artistic expressions, material culture, and political and economic development.
- Identify ways in which the environment has shaped Hawaiian and Pacific island culture.
- Describe the integration of land in Hawaiian cultures and the historic changes in the relationship between people and land through written and oral communication.
- Describe aspects of Hawaiian relationships with other groups of people in and outside of Hawai'i. Identify implications of the relationships and develop proposals for possible ways to affect positive change.
- Identify, access, and evaluate major Hawaiian studies sources.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

UNIT QUIZZES

There will be three Unit Quizzes which will assess your command of the information presented in power point lectures, website information, readings and videos which will include but is not limited to terminology (in English, Hawaiian and Pacific languages), ideas, concepts, people, dates, etc. Each of the Unit Quizzes will include 50 objective questions (multiple choice, true/false, fill in the blank, etc.).

All three 1.5 hour Unit Quizzes will be posted and taken on Laulima and you will have one chance to take each one (see daily schedule for specific dates). The questions are assigned randomly by the testing system so everyone will have randomized questions. You have access to your grades through Laulima, so you can get your Exam grade and keep track of your progress in the course. Because I will be checking your answers for spelling errors etc., you will have to wait until you receive an email from me letting you know that your grade is finalized.

MAP QUIZZES

There are two map quizzes to be taken via Laulima in the semester: the first map quiz is of the Hawaiian Islands and includes the O'ahu moku. The other map quiz is of the Pacific islands. You are able to take the 2 quizzes only during their designated time frame (see daily schedule for specific dates). You will be able to take each quiz twice and your best score will count towards your course grade. The quizzes will be in a matching format. You will not be graded on your ability to spell the names. I am more concerned that you know where they are in relation to one another. NETIQUETTE QUIZ

The Netiquette quiz will be given in order to test your etiquette on the Internet, simple rules for how you should act in Cyberspace that keep things polite and help everyone get along. You will have 30 minutes and 2 chances to complete this 10 point quiz.

DISCUSSION POSTS

Weekly Discussion Posts will be released at 6:00am every Monday morning on Laulima along with the release of the weekly powerpoint lecture(s). Some of the questions may pertain to the lectures and readings; other questions may require you to look at materials on the web. *Discussion Posts are due the following Monday before 11:55 p.m. HST unless noted otherwise.* (Please refer to the specific assignment for instructions and actual due dates).

You are expected to participate in all course discussions in a manner informed by respect for others, including those with views that may be different than your own. You are responsible for and may be tested on all material discussed online. Lack of participation may drop your course grade. You are required to comment on at least one other classmate's post in order to get full points. This is required and you will lose 2 points per discussion post if you have not provided at least one comment per discussion post.

FLIPGRID VIDEOS

You will be required to contribute 4 Flipgrid Video Posts to the course in order to encourage course "face-to-face" participation. Each post will ask a question and will require a Flipgrid video answer.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

Your grade will be based on the total number of points you earn in the various activities described above. The final grade-to-points correspondence will be based on the distribution of final scores. You can keep track of your progress

by keeping a tally of the points you earn on each assignment (see grade tally sheet at the back of this document) or by checking Laulima Gradebook regularly for grade updates.

COURSE ORGANIZATION

This course is divided into three units. The units are to be completed in order. For each unit you will need to:

- 1. Read & take notes on all of the unit materials, websites, videos & readings as you go through the materials.
- 2. Complete and participate in *Discussion Posts* by each of their weekly due dates.
- 3. You will have something due **every Monday by 11:55 pm.** Please make sure you keep up with your course due dates (see Online Course Schedule at the end of this document).
- 4. Study the material you collect throughout the course on a <u>regular basis</u>.
- 5. You will have 3 Unit Quizzes which are not cumulative; they only cover the material within each unit taught thus far.
- 6. You'll also have 4 Flipgrid Video Posts, please watch your due dates.

WEEKLY POWERPOINT LECTURES, VIDEOS & COURSE READINGS

A powerpoint lecture will be sent out each week by 6:00am every Monday morning. It will include clickable links to assigned websites, videos and readings to read/watch. The 'Announcement Tab" will automatically generate an email to announce the posted lectures. Participation on Laulima is mandatory in order to simulate a classroom atmosphere and to foster discussion among the group. Your participation and input are important to the overall success of this course.

NETIQUETTE GUIDELINES

Here are some Netiquette Student Guidelines for the class:

- Before posting your question to a discussion board, check if anyone has asked it already & received a reply.
- Stay on topic. Don't post irrelevant links, comments, thoughts or pictures.
- Don't type in ALL CAPS! If you do it will look like you are screaming.
- Don't write anything that sounds angry or sarcastic even as a joke, because without hearing your tone of voice, your peers might not realize you're joking.
- Always remember to say "please" and "thank you" when soliciting help from your classmates.
- Respect the opinion of your classmates. If you feel the need to disagree, do so respectfully and acknowledge
 the valid points in your classmate's argument. If you reply to a question from a classmate, make sure your
 answer is accurate!
- If you ask questions, many people respond. Summarize all answers and post that summary to benefit your whole class.
- Be brief. If you write a long dissertation in response to a simple question, it's unlikely that anyone will spend the time to read through it all.
- Don't badmouth others. You may disagree with their ideas but don't mock the person.
- If you refer to something your classmate said earlier in the discussion, quote just a few key lines from their post so that others won't have to go back and figure out which post you're referring to.
- Before asking a question, check the class syllabus or search the Internet to see if the answer is obvious or easy to find.
- Check the most recent comments before you reply to an older comment.
- Be forgiving. If your classmate makes a mistake, don't badger him or her for it. Just let it go.
- Run a spelling and grammar check before posting anything to your discussion posts.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR EXTRA CREDIT

In an effort to affirm multiple ways of learning and sharing knowledge, I will try to offer various extra credit options, which I encourage you to do outside of class (all extra credit is worth up to 5 points each). I will offer additional extra credit options via the Laulima Announcement tool as opportunities present themselves.

For each extra credit option, you will need to write a minimum two-page essay discussing the issues/purpose of the event and your reaction to the event. All extra credit papers are due on the last day of the semester. I encourage you to turn it in <u>sooner</u> rather than later and **submit it via the Laulima dropbox**. You may do as many Extra Credit papers as you wish, however, I will only give you credit for them if you are least achieving a "C" in the course, in other words, extra credit cannot help you if you haven't already done the minimal required course work. It is good to do if you just want that extra padding, "just in case."

LATE WORK & PAPER HAND-IN POLICIES

All work is to be turned in on the due date unless the student has a valid excuse (sickness, death in the family, others on a case by case basis). You must have written documentation in order to be considered excused. Once the instructor receives your documentation you and she will arrange a due date.
