#### **CATALOG DESCRIPTION**

A survey of gods, 'aumākua, kupua, mythical heroes, heroines and their kinolau as the basis of traditional Hawaiian metaphor. Pre-Requisites: Credit for HWST 107 or HAW 102; and ENG 100 (a C-grade or better)

#### STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. Evaluate and analyze the relationship between Hawaiian moʻolelo, Hawaiian religion, and Hawaiian social structure.
- 2. Analyze how Hawaiian moʻolelo illustrate and set precedents for Hawaiian cultural values.
- 3. Compare and contrast Hawaiian and Western concepts of 'history' and 'myth'.
- 4. Identify and access major written and oral sources for Hawaiian mo'olelo. 2
- 5. Recount with details at least one Hawaiian mo'olelo and illustrate similarities with others.
- 6. Describe and classify different characters from Hawaiian mo'olelo are listed in the current catalog.

#### ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

- 1. Journal entries -25 pts each. 8 journal entries and writing assignments will be assigned throughout the course in response to weekly questions posted by the instructor.
- 2. Reaction papers-25 pts each. Students will be assigned short reaction papers for 4 videos and lectures.
- 3. Free writing assignments-25 pts each. Students will be assigned free writing assignments(8) each week.
- 4. Akua Info graphic-50 pts each. Students will build 2 info graphics profiling a character from one of the moʻolelo in depth.
- 5. Ka'ao essay- 300 pts. Students will select and analyze a theme/topic/loina Hawai'i from the mo'olelo, and compare and contrast it to western concepts. All topics must be approved by instructor.
