- 4. Discuss the format of composing a mele.
- 5. Discuss the correct pronunciation of 'ōlelo/words to mele.

COURSE TASKS

Assignments- The assignments that you are given to complete outside of class are given to support you within the class. You should keep up with the weekly assignments. The assignments are critical to the overall understanding that you will get from the class. The assignments are designed to give you a holistic understanding of Hawaiian music focusing on poetry and their stories and reflections.

Relection papers – a reflection paper will be submitted for each lecture presentation. The reflection paper is a written assignment that will be posted and submitted to the Laulima program.

Presentation/Performance- Video presentations may be requested pertinent to lecture subject matter. These video will be posted to the Laulima Program.

Final paper – A hard copy of all the reflection papers that will be submitted at the end of the course.
