COURSE TASKS

This class examines the Earth's Natural Environment. The structure and processes of major environments are discussed. **Assignments**:

It is assumed that you **read** and understand all the assigned parts of the online **textbook** and **lecture notes**. Think of the online **lecture notes** as a second online resource.

There will be **weekly quizzes** on the materials covered in the textbook **and** lecture notes. These quizzes count toward your final grade. The quizzes will be available through the <u>Assignments, Tests and Surveys</u> tab of Laulima.

There will also be **weekly discussions** posts students must complete for the participation points. These discussion posts count towards your final grade. The discussion posts will be available through the <u>Discussions and Private Messages</u> tab of Laulima.

Participation in weekly discussion posts is mandatory. Weekly discussion posts are scored for participation points.

Any changes in the content/material/schedule/procedure related to the class will be announced on Laulima in a timely fashion.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

Student Evaluation:

1. There will be **Total 300 Points** for the evaluation as follows:

Three Exams (60 points each) x 3 = 180 points
 Chapter Quizzes (5 points each) x 12 = 60 points
 Participation (5 points each week) x 12 = 60 points

Reviews for Exams are available in the <u>Exam Questions Review by Chapter</u> tab of Laulima. Also, students should use the Laulima Review function for **Weekly Quizzes**.

Requirement 1: You must achieve **60%** or better of the total of exams, quizzes and attendance/participation points to pass the course.

You must complete the **Exams** during the designated weeks of the semester. **Midterm Exams and Final** are non-proctored open book and taken at home through Laulima.

Requirement 2: No more than 50% missing weekly discussion entries

Participation (via Discussion) will be used to evaluate each student's achievement of course objectives listed above. Students missing discussion regularly (i.e. more than **50%** of possible number of entries), cannot be assessed for these objectives and likely **drop one letter grade**. Each week, students will be required to do **two (2) posts** as part of their discussions (to earn the 5 possible points each week).

Please refrain from subjects that are not appropriate in public discussion.

Extra Credit Exam (Extra 15 points)

There is an extra credit final exam that is worth up to 15 points extra credit. Think of it as an extra credit practice final exam.

Grading uses the standard scale:

- 1. **A**: 90.0-100.0%, **B**: 80.0-89.9%; **C**: 70.0-79.9%, **D**: 60.0-69.9%, **F**: 0-59.9%.
- 2. For Cr/NC options, Incomplete ("I" grade), and "W" grade, see the WCC College Catalog.
- 3. There is no "N" grade in this class.

- 1. There is NO extra credit work other than the **Extra Credit Exam** (unless announced via UH e-mail).
- 2. There are **NO make-ups for <u>missed</u>** quizzes or missed Weekly Discussions.

- (2) You will do **two posts/comments** for each of 12 chapters.
