"Hawaiian 102: Elementary Hawaiian II" is a continuation of Hawaiian 101 and is designed to continue your progress through the novice levels of Hawaiian language.

Student Learning Outcomes

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate the increased ability to comprehend and respond to basic spoken Hawaiian about daily activities, about the student's life and interests and to narrate past, present and future events.
- 2. Demonstrate the increased ability to read and write Hawaiian sentences using more grammatical patterns and a working vocabulary of some 1,000 words, plus idiomatic expressions.
- 3. Speak Hawaiian with increasing fluency and with correct inflection, intonation and rhythm.

Course Format

This course covers two mahele (units). Mahele 3 consists of four ha'awina (modules) and mahele 4 consists of four ha'awina (modules). Each ha'awina contains learning materials i.e., tutorials, readings, and assignments. Each ha'awina and mahale will last approximately one week in length. Additionally, more specific objectives will be provided during the course for each module:

- Ha'awina 10 An introduction to negative verb sentences and numbers.
- Ha'awina 11 An introduction to 'Have a' sentences.
- Ha'awina 12 An introduction to 'Have a number' sentences and K-less possessives.
- Ha'awina 3 Unit Review A review of the content from unit 3.

• Mahele 3 'O Wai Kēia? (Guess Who)— A presentation that will showcase our proficiency in listening and reading comprehension, as well as communicating through speaking and writing.

Mahele 4 (Unit 4)

- Ha'awina 13 An introduction to Ke verb nei sentences and locatives.
- Ha'awina 14 An introduction to comparative sentences and negative imperative sentences.
- Ha'awina 15 An introduction to verb classes and stative verbs with causatives.
- Mahele 4 Unit Review A review of the content from unit 4.
- Mahele 4 'Ai Kolekole A presentation that will showcase our proficiency in listening and reading comprehension, as well as communicating through speaking and writing.

Course Tasks

- Quizzes (325 points total)
 - The student will complete online quizzes to assess their comprehension of course materials. The quizzes will be based on the lectures and assigned reading for the week. Although the quizzes are open-book, they are timed. As such, students who have not studied can expect to do poorly on the quizzes. For each quiz, the attempt yielding the highest score will be used to calculate the student's grade.
- Assignments (230 points total)
 - The student will complete 9 chapter exercises and 18 topic posts on Google Slides. The purpose of topic post assignments is to create a sense of community, encourage speaking skills, and open discussion of course topics between students in the class. Your posts and responses will be graded based on effort, clarity, and accuracy.
- Review 3 (40 points)
 - o A unit review of the materials covered from Ha'awina 10 -12.

- Review 4 (40 points)
 - o A unit review of the materials covered from Ha'awina 13 15.
- 'O Wai Kēia? (60pt)
 - o The student will select a prominent well known individual of Hawai'i (past or present) and without naming the individual, create a video giving clues regarding certain characteristics, contributions, and well known facts about the selected individual to which your peers will have to guess who the individual is. A letter/script will also accompany the video.
- 'Ai Kolekole (60pt)
 - This is a group project in which students will partener up and 'ai kolekole or "talk story" amongst themselves. The group will compose their talk story using learned sentence patterns and vocabulary/phrases and video record their conversation. A letter/script will also accompany the video.

Calculation of grade: The final letter grade for this course will be determined on the basis of the total number of points and will follow the normal University of Hawaii grading system. Thus, the letter grade is determined by the percentage of points accumulated, based on the following scale:

C - 70% - 79% (528 - 603 points)

D - 60%-69% (453 - 527 points)

F - 0.59% (0 - 452 points)
