Course Information

Catalog Description

An introductory course with emphasis on principles of human behavior. Topics covered include motivation, learning, perception, emotion, development, personality, states of consciousness, group processes, problem solving and thinking, and methods of inquiry.

Prerequisites: None

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Recognize the study of psychology as a science.
- 2. Discuss the biological and environmental basis of human behavior.
- 3. Integrate the basic perspectives, concepts, principles, and general information comprising the field of psychology.

Required Materials

Course Format

This is an asynchronous, online class conducted in Laulima. Asynchronous means there are no face-to-face class meetings, or any set meeting times. You are not required to come to campus at any time. However, you are welcome to contact me if you would like to schedule a phone, on campus (in person), or online meeting for individual assistance.

This course is organized into weekly modules. Each module will open on Mondays at 5 AM except for the first module which will open on the first day of the course. (Note: All times in this course refer to Hawai'i Standard Time.)

Course content will be delivered through:

- online readings and videos
- guided online activities
- various worksheets and articles
- online discussions
- quizzes
- projects

You are invited to participate in this supportive, cooperative, collaborative learning environment where all members (students and instructor) are recognized as important contributors and resources. I encourage you to work together in the pursuit of academic excellence. Academic excellence can be pursued and achieved by each and every one of you.

Recognize that you are a valued member of this community of learners. You bring to the class your unique experiences, ideas, and knowledge that can enrich others' learning experiences. As a member of this learning community, you are expected to actively participate in the class. Ask questions, participate in discussions, and offer your thoughts.

Please be prepared to contribute to this class by keeping current with reading and writing assignments. Each week, we cover a significant amount of information, and the lessons you will learn build upon each other. Be sure to plan enough time to thoroughly go through all materials presented each week. Don't just click around or you might miss critical information. Read carefully, and ask questions whenever necessary. Your questions are welcomed and encouraged. Also, don't worry about making mistakes - making mistakes is just another way we learn.

If you are experiencing a problem, don't wait to speak up and ask for help. Post general questions to the discussion board (private issues should be sent to me directly via email).

In reality, I understand that life happens regardless of this course, so please connect with me if you are having trouble keeping up with the lessons and coursework to see if we can find a solution that will allow you to complete the class.

Important: This course is offered in a 8-week time frame. Please note that this is not a self-paced course, the class schedule is strictly followed. In this condensed course, you will face the imperative task of swiftly mastering the art of efficient editing and paper submission for grading. The accelerated pace demands a rapid learning curve as you navigate the intricacies of completing tasks quickly and submitting your work promptly while adhering to deadlines. This process necessitates honing critical self-editing skills, embracing feedback constructively, and adapting to a more compressed timeline.

Participation Verification

Discussions: Every week your coursework will open on Mondays at 5 AM. The weekly discussion questions are due by Wednesday and your responses to three (3) of your classmates' posts are due by Friday. Occasionally there may be a holiday or situation where these dates will be changed. I will give you advance notice. Interaction with classmates and responding to the discussion questions is vital to the course and accounts for a significant part of your grade. Your consistent and thoughtful participation in the discussions is paramount to this course being meaningful and providing insight that has the potential to enhance your life beyond this course. There are discussions and assignments every week during the entire semester. The first required assignment is a self-introduction post worth four points. If you read this, email me your favorite place in the world so I know you are exploring the syllabus (two extra credit points). *Please include your course CRN number in the email.

- Weekly discussion post (approximately two paragraphs/100-200 words)
- Response to three (3) classmates' discussion post (approximately one paragraph)

Your post to the discussion question should offer information that is relevant, substantive, and insightful. You are welcome to pose a question you would like discussed or pursued further, recommend a website, image, or short video that you find pertinent and helpful to understanding the topic, and/or reflect on your own experiences. Organization, clarity, and integration of course content will determine your grade (see grading rubric below). Responses to your classmates should reflect reasoned ideas based on what you have learned from the course and your personal experiences. Include terms and/or concepts from the reading and learning materials provided and highlight them in your post.

Simply stating "I agree" will not earn you credit for a response to a classmate's post. Your responses should be meaningful and include substance.

Assignments: Each week you will have an assignment based on topics in positive psychology worth 2 points. Make sure to follow instructions.

Quizzes: Quizzes will consist of Multiple Choice, True and False, and Essay Questions.

Exams: Exams will consist of the Midterm Project and Final Exam (Paper). Midterm is worth 40 points and will consist of a project on a topic of choice that resonates with your personal learning style. I will offer some examples for ideas later in the course. The Midterm Project will be on a topic you are passionate about or very interested in and should be fun and engaging! The Final Exam Paper is worth 40 points.
