CATALOG DESCRIPTION

An elementary course in the Hawaiian language which focuses on rules of grammar, pattern drills, the building of an adequate vocabulary to facilitate conversation, and reading of selected materials at an elementary level.

Optional Activities at Scheduled Times Other than Class Times

Throughout the course, students are welcome to join weekly **Office Hours** to ask questions and/or discuss the learning materials with the instructor. No appointment needed. Starting in week 2, students have the option to log on to Zoom once a week for **Hui Kama'ilio** to practice conversational skills with Hawaiian language students and Hawaiian language instructor. Hui Kama'ilio details are posted in "Zoom Meetings" on the course site.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. Recognize and reproduce the correct pronunciation of consonants, semivowels, vowels, diphthongs, words and names in Hawaiian.
- 2. Demonstrate the ability to comprehend and respond to basic directions, requests, questions and answers.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to generate basic phrases and sentences for everyday situations with a vocabulary of 400-500 Hawaiian words, plus idiomatic expressions.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to read and write Hawaiian sentences at an elementary level on subject matter covered in class.
- 5. Speak Hawaiian with the proper inflection, intonation, and rhythm.

COURSE FORMAT

This course covers two units (mahele) along with two transcription and mimicking exercises and two reading exercises. Mahele 1 consists of seven ha awina (topics) and mahele 2 consists of four ha awina. Each ha awina contains learning materials i.e., lectures, tutorials, readings, and assignments. Ha awina will last approximately one week in length. Additionally, more specific objectives will be provided during the course for each topic:

Mahele 1 (Unit 1)

- Ha'awina 1 An introduction to the alphabet, orthography, and sound of the Hawaiian language through everyday phrases, place names, and our Ali'i.
- Ha'awina 2 An introduction to Class-Inclusion sentences and noun phrases in Hawaiian.
- Ha'awina 3 An introduction to Equational Sentences, expanded Class-Inclusion sentences, and noun phrases with definite articles.
- Ha'awina 4 An introduction to Imperative sentences.
- Ha'awina 5 An introduction to Stative Verb sentences and plural pronouns.
- Ha'awina 6 An introduction to simple verb sentences and infinitives.
- Mahele 1 Midterm Unit Review, Ho'olauna & Group Collaboration

Mahele 2 (Unit 2)

- Ha'awina 7 An introduction to *Ua* Verb sentences, or past tense, expanded Class-Inclusion and Equational sentences, and Imperative sentences as suggestions.
- Ha'awina 8 –An introduction to future and progressive action sentences, and family terms
- Ha'awina 9 An introduction to K-possessives and locational sentences.
- Mahele 2 Final Unit Review 2, Ho'olauna Ali'i & Group Collaboration

Ho'olohe & Ho'opili (Transcription & Mimicking)

• An introduction to transcription and mimicking native speakers.

Heluhelu Puke (Book Reading)

• Read a book(s) to the class.

COURSE TASKS

- Quizzes (724 points total)
 - The student will complete online quizzes to demonstrate proficiency in SLO 2 and assess comprehension of course materials. The quizzes are based on the covered learning materials for the respective week. Although the quizzes are open-book, they are timed. As such, students who have not studied can expect to do poorly on the quizzes. For each quiz, the attempt yielding the highest score will be used to calculate the student's grade.
- **Assignments** (587 points total)
 - The student will complete 9 chapter exercises and 27 video topic posts to demonstrate proficiency in SLO 1, 2, and 5. The purpose of the video assignments is to create a sense of community, encourage speaking skills, and open discussion of course topics between students in the class. Your posts and responses will be

graded based on effort, clarity, and accuracy. Assignments align with meeting SLO 1, 2, 4 and 5.

- **Ho'olohe & Ho'opili** Transcription & Mimicking (100 points total)
 - The student will complete transcription exercises by listening to a recording of native speakers and fill in the missing phrases/words/sentences of the provided transcription to demonstrate proficiency in listening, writing, and reading comprehension meeting SLO 4. The student will also demonstrate proficiency in SLO 5 through mimicking the recording of the native speaker(s).
- **Heluhelu Puke** Book Reading (100 points total)
 - The student will complete book readings as well as respond to book readings to demonstrate proficiency in SLO 4.
- **Midterm** (180 points)
 - o To assist in meeting SLO 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, the student will complete unit 1 review of the materials covered from Ha'awina 1 6 and two projects (Ho'olauna and Group Collaboration) to showcase proficiency in communication through speaking and writing, as well as listening and reading comprehension.
- Final (192 points)
 - o To assist in meeting SLO 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, the student will complete unit 2 review of the materials covered from Ha'awina 7 9, as well as a final that will showcase proficiency in communication through speaking and writing, as well as listening and reading comprehension.
- Late assignments will be accepted.

Calculation of grade: The final letter grade for this course will be determined on the basis of the total number of points and will follow the normal University of Hawaii grading system. Thus, the letter grade is determined by the percentage of points accumulated, based on the following scale:
