#### CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Continuation of HAW 101. (4 hours lecture) An elementary course in the Hawaiian language which focuses on rules of grammar, pattern drills, the building of an adequate vocabulary to facilitate conversation, and reading of selected materials at an elementary level.

### STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate the increased ability to comprehend and respond to basic spoken Hawaiian about daily activities, about the student's life and interests and to narrate past, present and future events.
- 2. Demonstrate the increased ability to read and write Hawaiian sentences using more grammatical patterns and a working vocabulary of some 1,000 words, plus idiomatic expressions.
- 3. Speak Hawaiian with increasing fluency and with correct inflection, intonation and rhythm.

# **COURSE TASKS**

HAW 102 (CRN 62096) is a 16 week, online synchronous course. We will meet 4 hours a week for direct instruction and there will be up to 8 hours of work a week to be completed outside of class hours. The following is a schedule of work and activities for the semester.

### ASSESSMENT TASKS AND GRADING

### Grading

Students will be graded in three areas: Quizzes, Assignments, and Attendance & Participation. The final letter grade for this course will be determined on the basis of the total number of points and will follow the normal University of Hawaii grading system. Thus, the letter grade is determined by the percentage of points accumulated, based on the following scale:

A - 90%-100%

B - 80% - 89%

C - 70% - 79%

D - 60% - 69%

F - 0.59%

Grades may be curved at the instructor's discretion; however, the student should use the above grading scale to evaluate their performance throughout the class.

## **Attendance & Participation**

In-person attendance is *mandatory*. Class time will be used to practice engaging with one another in the language and is important to developing adequate communicative skills in the language. Points will be given for attendance & participation in addition to the following policies:

- Four (4) tardies equal one (1) absence

- Five (5) absences result in 15% decrease in final grade
- Six (6) absences result in 20% decrease in final grade
