# A. PARTICIPATION: (10%, 100 points of total grade):

Each student will be expected to participate each week. Activities are designed to complement information in the text. Optimal learning will require preparation through reading and processing, and then sharing the work product or information in class or online class forums. It is important to plan ahead to make certain you complete the work required outside of class so you are ready to share with the class at the time the topic is discussed.

Each student is viewed as a Learner/Peer Teacher. Your shared observations, knowledge, skills, questions, and responsive listening are valued and contribute to a positive learning environment. Consequently, it is important that every student to contribute to the interactive learning that is an important part of every course. To receive credit for participation, each student will need to participate, on time.

## B. CHAPTER ASSIGNMENTS (30%, 300 points of total grade):

Assignments will be made available online at the start of the semester. Each week the students are expected to watch a video of the assigned chapter(s) and then complete the assignment(s) for the assigned chapter(s). Each individual chapter assignments will consist of questions that come directly from the videos. Assignments can only be submitted once so look over the assignment questions watch and rewatch the video to obtain the answer. Upon answering all the questions submit the assignment. Students may complete the reading and assignments, in order, at a faster pace if they so desire; however, in the interest of proficient grading and to motivate students to ration work efficiently, assignments and postings must be completed BEFORE the stated deadline. Each chapter assignments are worth a possible total of 20 points, x15 chapters, for a total possible 300 points.

# C. PORTFOLIO POSTING AND RESPONDING (30%, 300 points of total grade):

TO OBTAIN FULL POINTS EACH POST NEEDS TO BE 300 WORDS AND EACH RESPONSE 100 WORDS LONG.

This is the single most important activity over the course of the semester. To be successful in this segment of the course, students need to start early and work each week to complete this assignment. The Posting and Responses in this course will be used as your writing assignment for the course. Please take this into account when writing your posts. Be aware of grammar structure and writing styles. The grading of each post and response is as follows (an example is provided in Laulima):

- i. Find a point or term from the chapter that you are writing about, and apply that point or term to an experience or observation you have seen in your life. (Post these under each Chapter heading)
- ii. Provide an artifact (pictures, drawings, poems, etc.) that links to your posting or question. (Provide this as an attachment to your posts)
- iii. The writing must be 300 words, double-spaced with 1-inch margins, using 12 point New Times Roman font.

## D. QUIZZES (300 pts or 30% of total grade):

Complete each chapter quiz for a total of 15 quizzes. Each quiz will cover the important terms, concepts, and ideas from the chapter.

# E. SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION

Participation in an SI session will provide students opportunities to learn the material in a smaller group setting. Students that participate will have a ability to retake a chapter quiz.
