Course Format & Structure

This course is offered in an 8-week time frame. Please note that this is not a self-paced course; our course schedule is provided in this syllabus.

We have two sections of ACC 200 coupled into one course that shares the same Lamakū site and the same MyAccountingLab course. Both sections participate in the same discussion forums and complete the same work over the 8-week course term:

- Synchronous activities, such as our weekly meeting on Mondays at 10:00 are officially for the Synchronous section of our class but all students are welcome to attend and fully participate. If you are an asynchronous student, you may want to consider attending on Mondays to gain a better understanding of the material and/or to reinforce what you have learned via the asynchronous modality.
- Content release: All course modules are available from the start of term. The calendar near the end of this syllabus lists the completion dates for each module. Please keep pace with this schedule. It is very difficult to catch up if you fall behind.
- The majority of the student/instructor interaction is in an asynchronous format. As you will note in the syllabus, you are required to have two (2) live Zoom meetings with the instructor over the 8-week course term. Additionally, you are required to post your questions in the Q&A Discussion Forum. You are welcome to post as many questions as needed. We also have four (4) topic specific Discussion Forum Questions over the 8-week course term.

Regular Substantive Interaction (RSI)

Online courses at Windward Community College follow the college's [RSI Definition](#) for ensuring quality instruction. You can expect me to communicate with you frequently (and in a timely fashion) about our coursework in the following ways during our 8-week:]

- *Announcements:* At the beginning of each week students can expect regular announcements which provide you with the plan for the week along with other important information.
- *Assignments:* The Lamakū gradebook will be updated on a regular basis, approximately every two to three weeks. Your homework and quiz grades are computed as the average

chapter scores multiplied by the total possible points. You will also be given credit for your instructor meetings, and discussion posts during these grade updates. The final exam grade will be available in Lamakū at the end of the 8-week term. I will provide necessary feedback to each student based on these periodic assessments.

- *Discussions*: I will monitor your discussion forum activity on a weekly basis and will update your gradebook accordingly when I make my periodic gradebook updates. For the Q&A Discussion Forum, I will respond as indicated above. I will add to the other discussions as I see needed.
- *Publisher activities*: I will provide video examples that will aid you in your completion of the MyAccountingLab coursework. While my video examples may not be the exact problems that you're working on, the topics are very similar and you will find great value in what I demonstrate. Students should post any MyAccountingLab assignment related questions to the Q&A Discussion Forum where I will provide a detailed response and feedback. I will provide my feedback responses in the Q&A Discussion forum according to the turnaround time listed above.
- *Q&A*: I will check the Q&A Lamakū Discussions on weekdays between 10:00AM and 1:00PM.
- *Quizzes and Exams*: The primary source of Quiz and Exam feedback will come from the MyAccountingLab generated answers which appear once the quiz/exam deadline has lapsed. From these results, I will provide key areas to focus on shortly after the deadline.
- *Student Check-Ins*: Students are required to schedule two (2) Zoom meetings with me over the 8-week term. All scheduling will be student initiated via the STAR App. These meetings are meant to check in and see how you are doing in the course.
- *Study Sessions*: Prior to the final exam, I will utilize the normal Monday 10:00AM Zoom meeting as an exam review/prep session. All students, asynchronous and synchronous are encouraged to attend.

All course activity due dates are listed in the course schedule on the last page of the syllabus. Please check your UH email often and set your [Lamakū Notifications](#) (both email and D2L Brightspace [Pulse App](#)) to receive course notices, such as grading updates, announcements, and activity reminders. I will keep our Lamakū course Grades as current as possible.

Catalog Description

Introduction to practices and procedures used to report internal operations to management. Topics include manufacturing operations, budgeting, standard costing, cost-volume-profit analysis, job and process costing, statement of cash flows, and financial statement analysis.

Pre-Requisite(s): ACC 201 with a grade of "C" or better or equivalent or consent of instructor.

Student Learning Outcomes

As a result of taking this course, students can expect to attain the following outcomes:

1. Analyze, record, and report equity and long-term liability transactions related to partnerships and corporations from both an issuer and investor perspective using GAAP.
2. Prepare and analyze the Statement of Cash Flows.
3. Analyze financial statements using horizontal analysis, vertical analysis, and financial statement ratio techniques.
4. Describe the concepts of managerial accounting and explain how they are applied to various business models.
5. Analyze, record, and report the activities of a manufacturing company using process cost, job order cost, and standard cost accounting systems.
1. Prepare information and reports that may be used by management to plan, direct, motivate, and control a business using Cost-Volume-Profit analysis, incremental analysis, and operational and capital budgeting techniques.

Because this is an online course, most of the assigned activities will occur at unscheduled times. Students are required to have two (2) one-on-one Zoom meetings with the instructor during the term of the course. - Lamakū courses will appear 5 days before the first day for the academic term and will become inactive (no longer be available to access) 3 weeks after the end of the term. Be sure to save any coursework you may need from Lamakū *during* the term.

Grading Policy

Homework and Quizzes are graded based on their respective overall average chapter percentage. In other words, I will average your chapter percentages for homework and multiply that average percentage by the total available homework points (40). The same process is used to get your overall quiz grade. I encourage you to work and rework your homework over the 8-week term. It has been shown that you learn problem based material with more repetition. I will use your highest scores, so you should not hesitate when deciding whether or not to rework an assignment. Please note that the reworked assignment will not be exactly the same as the original, so you will continue to be challenged. This is the best way to learn accounting.

Assessment, Tasks, and Grading

The homework assignments provide you with simulations of real-world accounting skills which are transferable into the 21st Century workplace of most organizations including place-based and/or culturally-sustaining, Hawai'i based organizations.

Activities Required at Scheduled Times Other than Class Times

Homework assignments, discussion posting, quizzes, exams, and instructor meetings all happen outside of the scheduled Monday class sessions.

- **HOMEWORK (40 Points Overall)**

Assigned homework must be submitted via the MyAccountingLab online portal. The last page of the syllabus provides a listing of the chapters and their assigned weeks. Each chapter's homework assignment should be completed during the week listed.

MyAccountingLab allows you multiple attempts at each homework problem. As such, students are allowed to make additional attempts at older homework problems throughout the eight (8) week term. Your final homework grade will be determined using an export of your homework scores as of the last day of instruction. Any homework that is submitted after the last day of instruction will not be considered when computing your overall course grade. The overall homework score is computed by averaging all of your chapter homework percentage scores and multiplying that average by 40 points.

- **QUIZZES (30 Points Overall)**

There will be a for each assigned chapter in MyAccountingLab. You must take each chapter's quiz during the assigned week. I will average your quiz scores and multiply that average by 30 points to get your overall quiz grade.

- **Zoom Meetings with Instructor (20 Points Total) (RSI)**

Each student will need to meet directly with the instructor via Zoom during the first two weeks of the term and again during the fourth and/or fifth week of the term. Each meeting is worth 10 points. Students can schedule their meetings in advance via the STAR application. Students are able to see the instructor's available times in the STAR application.

- **DISCUSSION & PARTICIPATION (10 Points) (RSI)**

The course is eight (8) weeks long. Students are required to participate in assigned Lamaku Forum Discussions. These discussions are to be held in Lamaku under Discussions. Each student must show Regular Substantive Interaction (RSI) with his/her fellow classmates by posting and responding in every assigned Lamaku Discussion forum. The discussion should focus on the course material. To receive the full 10 points for discussion

and participation, a student must:

- Make the minimum individual posting to each assigned discussion forum (see instructions in each forum); and
- Respond to a fellow classmate in each week's discussion forum
