‘Āina

Windward Community College is located in the ahupuaʻa of Kāneʻohe and Heʻeʻia in the moku of Koʻolaupoko on the island of Oʻahu. Both ahupuaʻa are directly connected to the moʻo ‘ōlelo of Pāpa and Wākea, who are seen as the ancestors of the Hawaiian nation. The campus sits beneath the puʻu of Keahiakahoe, which is also connected to many moʻo ‘ōlelo of this ‘āina. Because wind names and rain names are associated with specific ‘āina, the rain name of Kāneʻohe is known as the ‘Āpuakea and the rain name of Heʻeʻia is the Ulumano.

Course Format & Structure

This class is offered as an accelerated 8-week course. This class is an asynchronous online course. There are no scheduled meeting times and all interactions will be online through Lamakū. However, this is not a self-paced course; our course schedule is provided in this syllabus.

Vector algebra, vector-valued functions, differentiation in several variables, and optimization. (3 hours lecture)

Pre-Requisite(s): Grade of "C" or better in MATH 206 or MATH 242 or equivalent or consent of instructor.

Exams & Quizzes

- There are 6 computer-based quizzes due on Fridays. Each quiz is worth 50 points. The 2 lowest quiz scores will be dropped.
- There is one cumulative computer-based final exam due the last Friday of the term.
- The quizzes & final exam are timed, but not proctored and can be taken on any computer or device that runs MLM.

- For each quiz and exam, show work on paper or a tablet. Work will be uploaded to Lamakū. There is a 50%-point deduction for quizzes and exams submitted with no work.

MyLab Math (MLM) Homework

There are 21 computer-based homework assignments at 10 points each. Homework is due Fridays by 11:59 pm. There will be a 1% deduction per day for problems submitted after the due date. Final submission for late homework is the last Wednesday of the term.

Forum Posts

There will be 7 posts, usually due on Fridays. Each post is worth 5 points.

Extra Credit

- Each quiz review is worth up to 5 points of extra credit.
- The final exam review is worth up to 5 points of extra credit.
- The end of semester student survey (CES) is worth 5 points of extra credit.
